FROM THE PRESIDENT

2020 IAA Reunion

The 2020 Itazuke Alumni Association biennial meeting and reunion will be held on October 20 through 23, in Las Vegas, Nevada. Due to the lack of a person in the area, the selection of a venue has been challenging. Board members, Jan Arbuckle Bloomer and Mary Anderson Baker, new Reunion Committee member, Melanie Dell Young, and I met in Vegas to get the reunion started. After four days of visiting various hotels we settled on The Orleans Hotel and Casino which was moderately priced and more accommodating than others. We liked Mandalay Bay and South Point but they would have cost almost twice as much as the Orleans not to mention the Orleans gets a 4.3 out of 5 overall rating.



We decided to hold the reunion during the week, Monday through Thursday, to minimize the cost. Airfare should be cheaper also.

Registration Fees will be \$165 per person. Registration fees will increase to \$180 on July 1, 2020, and to \$195 on October 1, 2020. There will be no refunds after September 17, 2020, due to our commitments with the hotel.

Room rates will be \$89 per night, Sunday through Thursday. Friday and Saturday rates will be \$139. These prices include taxes and resort fees. You will be able to stay for three days on either end of the reunion (October 17 through 25, 2020) at these rates.

Hotel reservations may be made directly with designated people at the hotel by phone at 800-675-3267, or online at www.orleanscasino.com/groups. Just give them our assigned Reservation ID: AIA0C10. Hotel hours of operations are Monday through Friday from 7:00 am to 11:00 pm; Saturday and Sunday 9:00 am to 5:00 pm, Pacific Standard time. First night's room and tax will be required at the time of booking. The following methods of payment may be used for deposit: company check, American Express; Diners Club; MasterCard; Discover; VISA; JCB; Money Order. The hotel accepts company/personal checks for payment of deposits only and must be received a minimum of thirty (30) days prior to arrival date.

The cut-off date for room reservations will be September 17, 2020. We have a goal to meet so it is important to register early and stay at the hotel if possible. I found this information on the internet about Itazuke airfield: **Fukuoka: FUK** formerly known as **Itazuke Air Base**, is an international and domestic airport located 1.8 mi east of Hakata Station in Hakata-ku, Fukuoka, Japan.



The airport was built in 1944 bv the Imperial Japanese Armv Air Force as Mushiroda Airfield. After the war, the United States Air Force used the airfield as Itazuke Air Base from 1945 to 1972. Itazuke actually comprised three installations: Itazuke AB. Itazuke (Kasuga) Administration Annex and Brady Air Base (Camp Brady).
